Reflections in the Word:

Making the Impossible Possible

Greetings from The Ladder!

Our hearts are full of gratitude for the many ways each one of you has blessed our community, Oceana and God's Kingdom with your kindness to The Ladder. This February, The Ladder will celebrate its five-year anniversary – such a great milestone! In the upcoming year, the prayers of our heart are:

- to have 12 youth learning to be disciples.
- to raise pledges for one-third of our budget (approximately \$64,000). If our present donors maintain their giving and we
 meet our pledge goal of \$64,000, that means The Ladder will have raised about two-thirds of its budget.

As we move forward, here are two bold prayers we ask you to pray with us:

Lord, bring 12 youth to The Ladder whom you desire to be multipliers of the Gospel of Christ. Lord, bring the donors that you desire to be multipliers of the Gospel of Christ.

We are praying these big, bold, audacious prayers to the God who makes the impossible possible.

Charles, a Ladder staff member, challenged me with this: "Brian, you pray and pray, but then you talk with doubting words, like it will never happen." I was convicted of his claim. I know throughout the New Testament, Jesus makes the impossible possible. My wife and I have personally experienced a miracle: our son Jeffrey's life. When he was born, the doctors did not expect him to live, but he did. The only explanation the doctors gave us was, "He's a miracle!" God did the impossible in my son's life. Do I pray that way and talk that way? I pray that way, but many days I have doubts.

In Mark 9:14-29, Jesus makes the impossible possible by healing the demon-possessed boy:

- 22b The father of the boy asked, "If you can do anything, take pity on us and help us."
- 23 "'If you can'?" said Jesus. "Everything is possible for one who believes."
- 24 Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!"

The father did not ask Jesus boldly (notice the word "if"). I usually ask for my requests boldly, but then doubt creeps in. Like the father of the demon-possessed boy, I need to confess that I also suffer from unbelief. Lord, help me overcome my unbelief!

Then I began to think, "What does God require of us so that He can answer our prayers?" This took me on a quest to look up God's requirement for answered prayer. I was cautioned about applying a formula to God – if I do this, then God will do that. What the Word of God says about our part in answered prayer is instructive and powerful. I encourage you to read these related Bible passages on prayer: 2 Chronicles 7:14, James 5:16b, 1 John 3:22, Hebrews 11:6, Mark 11:25. We play a part in preparing our hearts. The most important aspect about our part in prayer is that we align our hearts with God's heart so that "thy Kingdom come, thy will be done."

I plan to pray for the two Ladder prayer requests listed above, using Bible passages as my guide, making the impossible possible. Jesus says in John 14:14, "You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it." The Ladder sincerely follows God and seeks to do His will; therefore, I believe our requests are aligned with what He wants, and I believe He will grant these requests. In 1 Corinthians 10:31, Paul says, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." Whatever you do (I believe that includes our prayers) must be for the fruitfulness of God's Kingdom, if we desire The Lord to answer. The two Ladder prayers listed above are for the good of God's kingdom. The Ladder exists to give God all the glory in everything we do at this center. Remember, today's impossible situation may become tomorrow's glorious testimony of making Jesus famous in Shelby and beyond.


Celebrating the Life of a Champion:

We are saddened to report the passing of our dear friend and Ladder champion (volunteer), Laura Beyer. Her friendly smile, cheery hello, and encouraging words that greeted many at The Ladder also served as her trademark at Shelby State Bank for over 30 years. Laura was a steady community member who influenced so many different aspects of Shelby – a true gem.



As one of the first champions at The Ladder when we opened in February 2016, Laura often said she did it for her husband, Bob, because he wanted to spend time here. Bob would arrive halfway through her shift whenever she volunteered. He would ride the exercise bike, walk, drink coffee, and talk with everyone. He was excited that this old, dilapidated building in Shelby had been renovated and turned into a com-

munity asset. Over the next couple of months, his health deteriorated, but he would still come to exercise. Before long, Bob went through a difficult stretch with Laura by his side, and he passed away on July 12, 2016.

Even though she had only been volunteering for a few months at the time of Bob's death, Laura just could not bring herself to return to The Ladder. She said she wanted to in her heart, but the grief was too much. The Ladder was a place that Bob and Laura had enjoyed together.

Several months later, in 2017, Laura started attending a Bible study at The Ladder, led by Pastor Paulette Zoulek. "Laura always came prepared with her scriptures read and notes made," recalls Paulette. "She did not hesitate to share from her life experiences, and her outgoing ways made her a joyful addition to our group."

After a two-year hiatus, Laura returned to volunteer again. In March of 2019, she began to share Jesus' love with everyone who came to The Ladder. She went above and beyond, even with our most difficult friends. She loved them all! With her contagious smile, she reached out to people to make them feel special.

Laura was such a blessing to our staff, other champions, and our members. Ladder staff member Cathy Zoulek considered Laura a good friend. "I miss her, but I feel so blessed to have so many good memories of the times we spent together," said Cathy.

When not at The Ladder volunteering or just coming to spend time, Laura modeled The Ladder's vision and God's command: loving her neighbor. She took people to appointments and served her church, the local hospital, and other organizations. For recreation, she danced, bowled, and played softball. Laura had a passion for antiquing, as well. She had vendor booths at antique malls in Pentwater and Muskegon. She would also gather weekly to play cards with friends. Spending time with her grandchildren and great grandchildren gave her great joy.

Laura's memories will be cherished by her family, neighbors, and friends. The Ladder family is so thankful to have had the opportunity to know and serve with her. She was a blessing to all. ‡
