
### Celebrating Life

#### Thomas Carr July 15, 1945—December 1, 2020

Thomas will always be remembered for his big heart for our community and our country. He made friends everywhere he went, greeting ladies with "Hi, sweetie!" and gents with a salute. When asked how he was doing, his favorite reply was, "Just peachy" because he felt that way in the presence of friends. He expressed his love for people by serving them, always willing to lend a hand no matter the inconvenience. He was quick to run an errand for a local business, hold open a door for a stranger, and share produce from his vegetable garden.



Prior to the COVID-19 shutdown in March, Thomas visited The Ladder Community Center nearly every day, playing pool, eating lunch, and volunteering. Thomas took his volunteer duties at The Ladder seriously, greeting members and ensuring the proper raising and lowering of the U.S. flag located at the front entrance. Vilene Rodgers befriended Thomas at The Ladder shortly after it opened in 2016. "It was like a second home to him," she said.

Thomas made sure to be last through The Ladder's lunch line, often standing at attention until

everyone had gotten their meals. He even helped serve those who were unable to carry their own tray. Ladder staff member Michelle Deuling commented, "I remember when he took burgers to Shirley because he wanted to make sure she was getting enough to eat, and the many times he held the door open because, he insisted, 'That's my job!'"

Thomas served our country proudly in the U.S. ARMY in the Vietnam War, from 1965 to 1967, earning the Vietnam Service Medal with two Bronze Service Stars. Thomas returned home with an undying love for our nation, respect for the flag, and reverence for the brave men and women who fought and died for our freedom.

Ladder staff member Cathy Zoulek recalled, "He didn't complain about or dwell on the things he didn't have. He was able to adapt to different situations and make the most of the life he had, even when life was difficult."

When it was time for him to leave, Thomas would straighten up, give a salute, and say, "Carry on." So that's what we're going to do. We'll miss you, Thomas. You were definitely one of a kind!

Dale grew up in Shelby. His 30-year military career began in 1956 when he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where he maintained and repaired Aerospace Ground Equipment. While in the Air Force, he lived all over the U.S. and Southeast Asia. He retired in 1988 as a Master Sergeant. Upon his return to Shelby, he worked at Tanner Plumbing and Heating for several years.

Upon his retirement, Dale enjoyed spending time with the locals he had known in his younger years, especially former classmates. He loved sharing stories of the past.

Dale was deeply committed to his family. He faithfully visited his son, Scott, who resides in an assisted living center. When his first wife, Louise, became terminally ill, he cared for her in their home until her death. Paulette Zoulek, a close friend of Dale's, said, "He was a man of strong moral values, very honest and kind."

Paulette and her husband Tony frequently accompanied Dale and his second wife Pat to dinner-and-movie outings, as well as Shelby high school basketball games. He was an avid cribbage player and also enjoyed dominoes and Skip-bo.

Dale was an active member of the Honor Guard for the Gordon Bates American Legion Post No. 30 in Shelby, participating in the funeral detail for local veterans and erecting flags honoring fallen veterans at the Benona and Stony Lake cemeteries. Kevin Van Dyke, who is in charge of the funeral detail for Post No. 30, said Dale participated in the 21-Gun Salute for many years.

Dale and Pat also cleaned the legion building regularly. Kevin originally met Dale years ago when he worked at Tanner's. "He was easy to talk to and always very friendly," said Kevin. "Nothing ever got him too worked up."

Dale and Pat came to The Ladder every week for the past few years to catch up with friends over coffee and play cribbage. Ladder staffer Michelle remembered Dale as a kind and gentle soul who bright-



ened her day whenever she saw him. She recalled the time he and Pat came in with hand-made pegs for the cribbage boards. "I'm sure they spent many hours as they hand-painted each little piece," said Michelle. "I am so grateful for the time God gave me to meet this precious couple. Dale will be greatly missed."
