## On a Quest to Be Warriors for Christ

Greetings from The Ladder!

In the past, when I attended my sons' and nephews' basketball games, I would yell, "Battle!" encouraging them to raise the intensity level. My family still laughs at me over that word. In the past six months, God has impressed upon me the need to battle for the hearts, minds and souls of our family, friends, neighbors, the youth of our community and our nation. What has been good in our country is now called evil, and what is evil is now considered good in many people's eyes.

Isaiah 5:20 reminds us that this has been Satan's plan since the beginning:

Woe to those who call evil good and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness, who put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter!

We are experiencing a spiritual battle of good versus evil, with Satan waging war against America and its people. This is not a political battle. The following week, José introduced me to Sam Stitt, the founder and leader of No Stones. Sam's passion is to see men become warriors for Christ. He desires for them to meet in small accountability groups weekly and study the Word of God. The Holy Spirit is moving in the hearts and minds of the men in this county. Henry Blackaby, the author of the book *Experiencing God*, writes, "Watch to see where God is working and join Him in His work." The Ladder is joining in God's work by allowing men's groups from No Stones to meet weekly here. Presently, there are four groups of men meeting. Two of those four groups are meeting at The Ladder.

The first thing in the morning during the past several months, I have been reading Ephesians 6:10-20, recognizing my need to put on the full armor of God daily to battle in this spiritual war we are up against. Yes, the Lord has impressed upon me the need to battle. Sam's interest in helping men become warriors for Christ caused me to ponder how we should teach our youth

to be warriors that battle. If we are teaching our youth how to battle with a warrior mentality, then I and other adults—especially men—need to know how to battle with a warrior mentality. As Christians, part of our daily routine should be to put on God's armor, which includes the sword of the Spirit. I know one thing for sure: we need to be on a quest to be a warrior for Christ, so we can battle against the enemy, Satan, and teach our youth how to battle, too.

#### **Our Daily Mission**

The Ladder is dedicated to impacting families by guiding youth to love and follow Jesus: read God's word, live in step with the Holy Spirit, and make disciples.

After many hours of prayer and discernment, the Lord made it clear to us that this is His mission for us at The Ladder. What does this look like in action?

Monday through Thursday we have middle school and high school youth hours from 2 to 4 pm. During this time, we build relationships with each youth as we hang out, playing various games and engaging in conversation. Every day we have a chance to be a consistent, positive adult presence in these kids' lives as representatives of Jesus Christ as His sons and daughters.

At 2:45 pm we take a break for a meal, which is provided by Shelby Public Schools' food service. We use this opportunity to share truth from the Word of God with the kids. First, we take a moment to pray and ask God to teach us from His Word through His Holy Spirit. Then we read the Bible, listen to the words, and apply them to our lives. We ask relevant questions to help the kids connect what we read to their own experiences, so they can apply these biblical principles to their lives moving forward.

During the month of March, we learned about what God's Word says about repentance and forgiveness by looking at various parables of Jesus. We then proceeded to discuss the events leading up to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

From 3 to 4 pm, we spend time having fun and playing games with the students, such as basketball, air hockey, ping pong, and billiards.

In addition to the youth hours, we continue to engage families through phone calls and texts. We look forward to bringing our families together in person in the near future.

God is faithful and goes before us each day. We are excited to see what God does through the disciples that are raised up here at The Ladder!

## Marge Sillman April 23, 1939 - March 11, 2021




