ON MISSION TO MAKE DISCIPLES

Thank you, dear friends, for being on the journey with God and The Ladder. We have been serving this community and surrounding area for seven years as of February 16. Yes, can you believe, seven years! We are grateful to all who have contributed and are contributing. Some of you pray, some of you give time, and many of you give of your resources. We are grateful for all of you. We cannot do this work without you. We need you!

About five years ago, Stuart Carver, Executive Director of Family God's Way, challenged me, "Brian you have to multiply yourself," meaning that I had to be on mission with Jesus to make disciples. He guided us to retool The Ladder to help others pursue God. Over the next two years, the staff developed a mission statement. This mission is not just my mission or the staff's mission, but it is the mission of every volunteer who signed on to be a community champion—a person committed to speaking and spreading The Ladder's mission.

The Ladder's Mission

The Ladder helps people pursue God by building caring relationships and sharing God's Truth. The coaches enthusiastically guide adults and youth to love God by following Jesus, living in step with the Holy Spirit, reading God's Word, loving people, and making disciples.

After the staff developed the mission, the next essential element was to define a disciple. The staff wrestled with this task. After much deliberation, we came up with this:

A Disciple is One Who...

- DECIDES: Turns and follows Jesus
- GROWS: Is being changed by Jesus
 - 1. Reads the Bible daily
 - 2. Talks to God regularly
 - 3. Listens to and obeys the Holy Spirit
 - 4. Connects to the body of Christ
- GOES: Is on mission with Jesus to make disciples (Relational Discipleship)
 - 1. Prays with and for people
 - 2. Loves people by building caring relationships
 - 3. Coaches Biblical truth and shares testimony
 - 4. Models Christ

The first person we are to disciple is ourselves. Jesus says, "A disciple is not above his teacher, but everyone when he is fully trained will be like his teacher." (Luke 6:40). This happens when we commit to growing and becoming more like Jesus through His Word, prayer, obedience to the Spirit, and fellowship. As we become more like Jesus, we become more effective in carrying out His mission. Real Christian maturity is being on mission with Jesus to help people pursue God.

Read the list of a disciple's qualities and ask yourself three questions:

- 1. Have I decided to turn away from my brokenness and follow Jesus?
- Am I growing—being changed by Jesus?
- 3. Am I on mission with Jesus to go make disciples in our broken world?

Jesus commands us to make disciples, bringing men, women, and children into the Kingdom with His help, so they in turn make disciples.

Matthew 28: 19-20

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

I encourage you to pray about these important aspects. Please consider taking steps forward in pursuing God and recruiting others to join the movement.

Throughout the three-hour event, we scheduled "Pit Stops," times when men would discuss questions like, "What are important marks you want to hit as a man?" and "What keeps you going in really difficult times?" The conversations were honest, meaningful and rich, which led to mutual respect, admiration and tremendous camaraderie. Powerful!

The event was followed by the first of eight Pit Stops that take place every Tuesday evening from 6:30 to 7:30 at The Ladder. The purpose of Pit Stops is to forge connections with other men in order to encourage each other in doing manhood God's way. We originally planned to have eight weeks of Pit Stops after our first kickoff event in October. After the eighth

week, the men (who vary in age from 12 to 74) did not want to stop. Eight weeks turned into sixteen weeks, and there seems to be no end in sight!

It's exciting to see a desire in men to be a HERO by doing manhood God's way. All men are welcome to join the movement. Your presence at our events, your prayers, and your financial support will be vital in creating a HERO culture. I know God will bless generations in our community when we hit His mark!

Kids Hope USA is a national movement that connects Christ followers with a child "in need" at the local elementary school. One



adult, one child, one hour, one day a week for one school year. It's the power of one — a one-onone relationship

with a child. Elementary school children may be referred because they struggle academically, but most are referred simply because they need the love and support and encouragement of a caring adult — one who says, "I believe in you! I am for you!" Of course, what child doesn't need that?

In the fall of 2022, The Ladder began a partnership with Thomas Read Elementary School in Shelby. The administration and staff have welcomed us into the school with open arms. Twelve people were trained to be Kids Hope mentors. Twelve more people committed to pray for these relationships. We prayed fervently for two things:

- That our mentors would be instruments of Christ's love, available for His use;
- 2. That our students would receive the love of a mentor and (one day) receive the love of Christ.

We waited for all things to be put in place. As the Kids Hope Director, I had the privilege of being with each mentor on their first day, when introductions to the teacher and child took place. Here is a story of one mentor meeting her Kids Hope child.

Lisa, a Kids Hope mentor, was excited to meet with six-year-old *Liam. We had been delayed in kicking off the relationship be-

cause Liam's mom was having second thoughts about her child's involvement in Kids Hope. We waited and prayed. Once his mom gave permission, Lisa — prayerfully and with great anticipation — stepped into Liam's classroom.

The teacher went over to tell Liam that he had a special friend waiting for him at the door. Liam hid under the table. Lisa and I stepped out of the classroom and prayed. After a couple of minutes, Liam and the teacher stepped out of the class-

room. Lisa knelt down and said, "Hi Liam. I'm Ms. Lisa, and I would love to be your Kids Hope friend!" Liam, head down, didn't respond or make eye contact. Lisa asked Liam if he would show her around the school. She wanted to see all his favorite things to do. Again, Liam didn't respond; he paused briefly before walking slowly down the hallway with Lisa. I found a seat near the office, waiting for the next mentor to come.

After a few minutes, I caught a glimpse of Liam looking hesitantly at Lisa and saying a few words. Forty minutes later, I crossed paths with Lisa and Liam again, just outside his classroom. Liam was smiling and talking freely with Lisa. He then gave her a BIG hug, not wanting to let go. After Lisa encouraged him to return to the classroom, Liam turned and walked in, and then made one last dash to Lisa for one more hug!

That day, I saw more than Liam and Lisa's journey to a trusting, joy-filled relationship. I saw both kids and adults "under the table" hiding from God; reluctant to talk with God, let alone look at Him. God lovingly pursues them, and in time, a conversation begins; few words at first, and more as time goes on. They sense a loving Father. Then one day, they decide they want to trust. They run to God and embrace Him. Secure in their new relationship, they run back to Him again and again. Could mentors — instruments of Christ's love — be used to open a child's heart to a trusting, joy-filled relationship with our Savior? We pray so.
