## **Avail Much**

Several months before the National Day of Prayer (the first Thursday in May), I received an email from Kathy Bransell, Director for the National Day of Prayer, inviting us to rally our community to come together and pray. The email shared that the theme verse for 2023 is found at the end of James 5:16 - "...The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much."

The verse was familiar to me. At The Ladder we have discussed what fervent prayer is and what it is not. We have pondered the definition of righteousness. But what caught my attention as I read through this verse once again were the last two words: avails much. They are two words of promise. God promises that when the righteous pray fervently, their prayers will avail much.

## How do we measure much?

The Greek word for *much* is *polus;* it is the word used to describe Jesus' glory in Matthew 24:30 and our reward in Heaven in Matthew 5:12. It is often translated *many* or *great*. John writes in his gospel, "There are also *many* (*polus*) other things which Jesus did, which if they were written in detail, I suppose that even the world itself would not contain the books that would be written." (John 21:25) I think you would agree that *much* is much, much more than you and I might have first thought. *Many/much....* is a lot!

Our humble, fervent prayer releases God's power into our circumstances. Our humble, persistent prayer releases God's goodness and glory into relationships, families, schools, communities, and governments. I thank God that He takes our *little* and makes it *much*. He takes our humble, fervent prayer and impacts not just the course of events, but the course of souls and the Kingdom. What *much* is God about to unveil and avail? Will we persist in praying no matter how hard, no matter how weary?

You may have heard of the recent movement of the Holy Spirit at Asbury College in Wilmore, KY. Thousands of young people gave all of their heart—their very lives—to the LORD. The movement continues. Dr. Vic Reasoner, a pastor, professor, and resident of Wilmore, recently spoke at revival services at Shelby Wesleyan Church. He said that, what many people don't realize, is that people in Wilmore pray. Seven days a week, 24 hours a day, you can find people gathered in their homes, on campus, and in churches—praying! They are convinced of the promise that fervent prayer avails much. They know that every revival, past and present, arises when the people of God are on their knees. That's convicting and challenging.

# Do we pray with anticipation that God will avail much?

We are thankful for the 45 men and women who have committed to pray faithfully for The Ladder. We are thankful for the 13 Kids Hope Prayer Partners who have committed to influence the life and heart of a child and their family through prayer. We are thankful for our afternoon Huddle youth who pray, writing prayers for our young-at-heart members. We are thankful for the young-at-heart who, in turn, write a prayer back to the Huddle youth. We are thankful that every Huddle youth is prayed for week after week. We are thankful that The Ladder staff can gather each morning to pray over The Ladder, our community, and our nation. We are learning and growing in our commitment to pray fervently.

Kathy Bransell closed her email with this question: "So, what much-availing, history-making, heart-drawing, stronghold-destroying, soulsaving, state-shifting, country-changing, God-glorifying prayers are you persistently praying?"
