You may not know this, but The Ladder provides opportunities for youth who have been involved in unlawful activity and have been ordered by the courts to complete community service hours. Each year a dozen or more youth come to The Ladder and complete those hours. Each youth is screened on the severity of the offense. Parents are involved in the initial meeting to go over all expectations. One requirement is that each youth be present at our daily Bible devotional. Most are agreeable to that requirement; a few opt out at that point.

Steve's story

Recently a young man, *Steve, came through The Ladder doors to ask if he could complete his community service hours. Nancy, our Community Service Coach, then met with him and his stepdad before his community service began. Steve came the first couple of days. Under Nancy's supervision, he completed chores, such as wiping down exercise equipment, washing tables, picking up litter outside, and taking out the trash.

On the third day, Steve dug his heals in, told Nancy that he wasn't going to do any more chores, and was going to leave. When I learned of this, I sat down and talked with him. After exploring what was wrong, I finally got to the heart of the issue: his mother was in the hospital. We talked some more, but in the end, Steve said he was done.

A couple days passed, and Steve didn't show. When he walked in the next day, we learned that his probation officer told him there was no getting around it—he had to complete his hours. Understanding the difficult situation of his mom's illness, we accepted him back at The Ladder, and he faithfully came in each day to fulfill his community service.

Toward the end of Steve's service, Nancy brought in some flowers. I happened to be sitting at the table next to him and Nancy, who patiently instructed Steve how to make a bouquet with the flowers. He cut stems at different lengths and assembled a beautiful bouquet for guess who? His mother! I could tell he was satisfied and proud of his work. He walked out of The Ladder a little taller that day—and more mature—with the bouquet in his hand.

Progress

What has happened since Steve completed his community service hours?

- He regularly participates in The Ladder's youth program, The Huddle.
- Staff and mentors model and teach Steve appropriate behavior.
- He brought his Mom (who is now out of the hospital and in a wheelchair) and stepdad to the Spring Fam Fest.
- He was majorly disappointed that Nancy wasn't able to attend the Fam Fest, because Steve wanted his mom to meet her.
- He is attentive during the Bible lessons.
- During the month of April, family worship was the focus. Daily the youth read a Bible passage, prayed, and listened to a song. After the song finished one day, Steve came up to ask for the name of the song. "I want to listen to that song again and share it with my Mom," he said.
- Recently he brought his Mom to The Ladder to meet Nancy.

Love in action and in truth

Steve is turning to God and his ways. He is soaking up the Bible. It will be exciting to see Steve becoming a man doing business God's way. This is just one success story from our experiences of helping youth complete community service hours.

One of our volunteers sums it up this way: "The Ladder is accepting of all and never gives up on anyone."

The Message Bible describes it best:

Proverbs 31:8-9

Speak up for the people who have no voice, for the rights of all the misfits. Speak out for justice! Stand up for the poor and destitute!

We all have a choice to make:

- Complain about the bad behavior of others (essentially giving up on them by not helping them grow),
- Ignore them (which also fails to help them grow), or
- Stand up for them by taking the time to listen, correct, forgive, teach, and celebrate them.

God gives us all opportunities to love people where they are at in life. We must seek the Holy Spirit's guidance in all situations, so God can work through us to reach the misfits, poor in spirit, and destitute.

One of my favorite parts of being the Youth and Men's Coach at The Ladder is leading a program called Men of Honor. Shelby Middle School has graciously given me the opportunity to have Men of Honor meetings after school in the library every Thursday. It is a voluntary club that about a dozen young men have attended over the last two years. Men of Honor instructs and encourages middle school boys in the principles of Biblical manhood.

One Thursday in April, I arrived to find that only one sixth grade boy showed up for our meeting. This was unusual, but instead of being discouraged, I decided to make the most of it.

Our conversation evolved into talking about the future. I described the vision I had of him as an honorable husband, father, grandfather, and even as a leader of Men of Honor in his community—wherever he ended up. I then took him to the end of his life, and the conversation went like this:

Me: "When you die, will you go to heaven or hell?"

Him: "I hope heaven."

Me: "You hope? You don't know for sure? Why should God allow you to go to heaven?"

Him: "Because I do a lot of good things."

Me: "So you're going to heaven because you're a good

person?"

Him: "Yes."

son?"

Him: "Sure."

Me: "Have you ever told a lie?"

Him: "Yes."

Me: "Have you ever taken something that wasn't yours,

even if it was small?"

Him: "Yes."

Me: "Have you ever been disrespectful to your parents?"

Me: "Have you ever used the Lord's name in vain? In other words, you used God's name like a four-

letter cuss word to express disgust?"

Him: "Yes."
