The prayer movement began in 1952 when a young evangelist, Billy Graham, led services for approximately 20,000 people on the steps of the Capitol. The observance, which was moved to the first Thursday in May by President Ronald Reagan, has been proclaimed each year since.

October 7, 1946-June 14, 2023



Dave, the father of four children and one foster child, had a huge influence on the many people who observed his generosity and kind heart. Family was his number one priority, which was evident in the care he gave to his wife and teenage son. He also counted The Ladder as family, as he helped with one need or the other. He blessed so many people with his thoughtfulness and care.

We are so grateful for the many ways Dave served his community here at The Ladder throughout the years. Dave showed his care for people when he would sit and keep others company so they didn't have to eat alone, even though he had already eaten. He also loved to cook and share his delicious soups and stews with all of us. Ladder staff member Fawn Lenon recalls, "He would share food with someone here who needed good home cooking. I could see his love for his fellow brothers and sisters."

During the COVID shutdown, Dave played a huge role in transporting boxes of food to The Ladder from the school every week, so we could distribute them to those in need. He did anything we asked of him, such as watering the plants daily, polishing the floors, and building a cart for the tables. "Dave was a tremendous asset to The Ladder, the staff and the members," recalls The Ladder's director, Brian Beckman. "He provided a full-service operation. When he heard The Ladder needed a bike rack, he made one for us. We are already missing this kind-hearted man. We have come to realize all the chores Dave did for us and for others."



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
