MODELING CHRIST: GREG McDonald

Thank you for following The Ladder's story and investing in our community. It has been an exciting journey, and we are so grateful for the way you have followed and participated in the journey. God is moving and working here daily. We give Him all the praise and glory.

On a late Friday afternoon in July, as I was about to leave for the weekend, I got a call from Greg McDonald's sister, Gail. She was calling to let The Ladder family know that Greg had passed away during a nap that afternoon. Earlier in the year, Greg had resigned from his position as The Ladder's Mental Health Coach to move to Oscoda, MI. This call was a hard pill to swallow because many had just talked with Greg that week. It was hard, too, because we had just lost our dear friend, Dave Richards, about a month earlier in the same way.

Soon after we opened almost eight years ago, Greg became a youth volunteer, mostly because he wanted to spend time with grandchildren who attended The Ladder. He volunteered with the youth a couple of days a week, playing pool, ping pong, foosball and other games. He was competitive; he didn't like to lose, but he could play just for fun. He later became a mentor when we piloted our youth mentoring program, The Pursuit. Greg was all in!

About four years ago, Greg approached me and said, "I believe the Holy Spirit is leading me to begin a mental health ministry here at The Ladder." He proposed to start two support groups: one for people with mental health issues and caregivers; the other group for those dealing with hurts, habits and hang-ups. After much prayer, The Ladder agreed to put him on staff and provide these support groups to the community.

Greg watched training videos on the Celebrate Recovery program, and he was proud of his National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) certification. In the beginning, he was leading support groups on Wednesday and Thursday evenings. He later added a third evening for people who suffer from bipolar disorder. This was a huge undertaking. He continued this until about six months ago.

It was through his involvement in the support groups, in staff meetings, and in Hero-Manhood God's Way that we really got to know Greg. His heart and ways reflected The Ladder's Philosophy of Ministry.

The Ladder's Philosophy of Ministry

- We believe real Christian maturity is all about helping people pursue God. The Biblical word for this is discipleship. Jesus modeled relational discipleship.
- We believe relational discipleship takes place in the context of caring relationships.
- We believe relational discipleship is rooted in God's truth.
- We believe that pursuing God, living to bring honor and glory to God, and helping others pursue God is a life-long endeavor.

Greg was a Christ-follower who loved people by building caring relationships. He was the Good Samaritan to so many people—his family, friends and group members. Chris, who attends one of The Ladder's groups, said, "If vou were a friend of Greg, you would be lucky, because he put his friends first-even in front of himself." Greg spent time with his daughter, worked on house projects, assisted his aging parents, and helped others with all kinds of projects. Upon his passing, he was in the process of battling to get a person's driver's license back after it was revoked for an excessive period of time.

Rachel, a group member, met Greg during a time in her life when she had no one. "Greg cared about every single person he met, including me," said Rachel. "God used Greg in my life every single week. He spent time praying for me, encouraging me and finding a way to help."

Greg coached Biblical truth. He shared the Bible with individuals and with the groups, too. Another person in Greg's group, Jason, penned a letter of appreciation for Greg, writing, "Greg often invited me to breakfast or lunch, so we could talk. He would quote scripture and always encourage me to walk with the Lord. I am thankful that the Lord brought Greg into my life when he did, and I will always be grateful for the friendship and brotherhood I shared with Greg!"

Most people cave when it comes to speaking truth to friends and family. Greg coached truth with the people he loved. He was willing to speak truth even when it was hard. He suffered because of it, but he was not willing to waive his beliefs even in difficult situations.

Greg shared testimonies of what God did in his life and in the lives of others. He was quick to share his humanity with others. Sharon, a group member, shared, "Greg spoke about his own struggles and had a very real understanding of mental health issues and how to get help." God was and is moving in the recovery group, with people sharing their stories and testimonies.

In closing, Greg is now rejoicing with his Father in heaven, because he loved God with all of his heart, soul, mind and strength. But for those of us left behind, what do we do? How do we move on? How about we follow Greg's lead, which is really Jesus' lead?

- 1. Let us love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength.
- 2. Let us love people by building caring relationships.
- 3. Let us coach Biblical truth.
- 4. Let us share testimonies of what God has done, is doing and will do with the people around us.

Remember that pursuing God, living to bring honor and glory to God, and helping others pursue God are life-long endeavors. I pray for us all to grow in our abilities to help people pursue God. Jesus modeled relational discipleship. Let us model relational discipleship, too.
