# VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT Fawn Lenon

To hear her talk about her life, one quickly realizes that life truly began again three years ago when she chose to acknowledge that Jesus is the Lord of her life. She freely shares about the lightness of heart she felt as she came up from the waters of baptisim and left the troubles and bad choices of the past behind. What is her response to this tremendous gift of love and forgiving grace? Why, it's giving to others, of course!

This heart to give back brought Fawn to The Ladder to serve God through community outreach. Initially, she filled in at the front desk, greeting guests and sharing a smile. She still fulfills this role on Tuesdays, but on Mondays and Wednesdays she indulges her love for cleaning by meeting the needs of The Ladder in this manner. The floors have never looked better. She will even come in on certain Saturdays to tidy up before people gather for worship.

Fawn's time at The Ladder isn't all about work, however. She joyfully joins in during the Monday and Thursday prayer meetings led by Donna Near, when the needs of the cancer patients are put before the Lord. And for the first time this fall, she participated in The Ladder's Fall Festival Fun Run.

Born in Hart, Fawn and her sister knew a troubled childhood, punctuated by fractured relationships and damaged trust. Frequent moves made it hard to feel connected to others and experience a sense of community. Too soon, adult responsibilities weighed down her youthful shoulders, pushing her to escape by running into an early marriage. What followed was a series of choices that numbed the hurt, but didn't fill the soul. She needed a U-turn. God answered her prayers in 2016 through a relationship with Jo Belknap at the Shelby Assembly of God church, and through meeting Rick Lenon, whom she wed on Valentine's Day in 2017. Thus began her journey of renewal.

Fawn and Rick live on Sixth Street in Shelby. They have three adult sons between them and extended family nearby.

She enjoys cooking and baking and tends to an ever-enlarging garden during the summer. Her goal is to learn how to can her own produce as her grandmother once did. She has a real heart for the senior community and once worked in Hart as a certified nurse's aide, just as her mother had done. These days she enjoys serving the seniors through her work at The Ladder and by cleaning for select individuals. Fawn's story is one of inspiration and hope. We can all use more of that.
