
Ray will be missed by many who came to hear him play his beautiful music. We are thankful for his service to our nation, his fellow veterans, and our community.



A Lot of HERO Manpower

February 17 was a record-breaking day! It was the single greatest gathering of men in Ladder history: More than 160 men gathered on a Saturday morning to hear the story of "The Naked Farmer."

Not only is 160 men packed into a gym a lot of testosterone, but it's also a lot of influence. As I looked with admiration at the men of our community, I saw pastors, farmers, police officers, business owners, and homeless men. Young and old. Men who came alone, fathers who brought their sons, and men who came with their team (Shelby Tiger Varsity Basketball). The day provided a memorable and meaningful common experience that will forever bind them together.

The theme of this season of HERO: Manhood God's Way is "The Power of a Man's Story." Our invited guest was Tim VanderZwaag, otherwise known as "The Naked Farmer." For 55 minutes, 320 eyeballs locked in on Tim, as he told his gripping and sometimes gruesome story of survival after being mangled in a PTO (power take-off) accident on his farm. Throughout the talk, Tim shared lessons that encouraged and challenged us as men and glorified God. His story emphasized and drove home the importance and benefits of men being in community with each other and men investing in the community, as opposed to simply living for themselves.

At the conclusion of the event, men were invited to be a part of our Tuesday night HERO gatherings called Pit Stops. The invitation was well-received, as last week we had 42 men attend our meeting. Each night a man gives a short testimony. There truly is power in a man's story. It leads to tremendous conversation and connections between men. These men trust each other and invest in each other even outside Pit Stop meetings. It's powerful and it's changing lives. In the last month, two men have surrendered their lives to Jesus and trusted Him to be their Savior and Lord. Men doing manhood God's way leads to stronger marriages, families, workplaces, churches, and a community of HEROES! A lot of HERO manpower makes a huge difference.

My prayer is that the youth in our community will think back on their childhood and be able to say, "I grew up in a community full of HE-ROES." Join the movement, men!
